Code of Conduct Reminders

Students, parents, teachers, support staff, principals, and school boards share responsibility for creating a school-wide approach to maintaining a positive and inclusive school climate where all students are supported to develop healthy relationships, make good choices, and achieve success in their learning. All members of Nova Scotia's school communities have a role to play in the awareness and prevention of unacceptable behaviour. The provincial school code of conduct policy applies to all public schools and school boards in the Province of Nova Scotia. All students and school members in Nova Scotia are required to follow this provincial school code of conduct policy, which is governed by the Education Act.

One of the examples of unacceptable behaviour that we are working on not having here at Smokey Drive is hands-on. We do not want our students to be pushing, pulling, hitting or throwing. We are encouraging them to keep their hands to themselves and to only use them for helping, not hurting. We would appreciate you reviewing this with your child.

Building Access

If you are coming into the school building to drop off or pick up a child, please report to the main office. Family members are not permitted to accompany children to their classrooms. School staff will be happy to escort them if needed and can drop items off.

Weather Appropriate Clothing

Students should come to school each day dressed for the weather conditions. Students go outside multiple times each day and it is important for them to be dressed warmly as the weather gets colder. This includes a warm coat, a hat and gloves or mittens. We will go out in all but extreme conditions. We only stay inside if temperatures reach -20 degrees or lower (with the windchill). It is also a great idea to keep a change of clothes in your child's backpack in case they need them.

Lost and Found Items

Our lost and found items will be displayed for another two weeks to give families a bit more time to come and look for any missing belongings. Any items left at the end of the day on Friday, November 14th, will be donated. We will also be donating any items still left at school after December 19th.

Reminders

Safe Dismissal

Please send teachers a note if there is a change to your child's dismissal procedure (ie, someone different is picking your child up, they are going home with a friend, etc.) This allows us to ensure that children are getting safely to their after school place.

Playground Safety and Supervision

Students are not to be arriving at school before 8:15 am without adult supervision and must come directly into the school after the bell at 8:25 am. There is no supervision for students before 8:15 am.

ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE (AI) AND YOUR CHILD'S LEARNING





WHAT IS AI?

Artificial Intelligence (AI) means computers that can learn from information and find patterns to help make decisions. Al doesn't think or feel like people—it uses data to make connections that led to informed responses.

HOW IS ALUSED IN SCHOOLS?

- Teachers choose if and how AI is used in the classroom.
- Some lessons may include AI tools for learning or creativity.
- Students learn how to use technology safely and responsibly.



HOW AI CAN HELP LEARNING?





- Help with idea generation when a child is stuck.
- · Adjust lessons to fit different learning needs.
- Change reading levels of text so it is more easily accessible.

Remember, teachers will always tell students when they can or cannot use Al for school work.

ALPRIVACY AND SAFETY TIPS:

- Never share personal info with AI tools.
- Only use apps approved by your school or regional centre.
- · Look closely at the age restrictions of AI tools.
- · Talk with your child about what's real, what's private, and what's fair online.



AT HOME YOU CAN HELP BY:

- · Setting screen time limits and tech-free times.
- Talking about what your child does online.
- · Reminding your child to check if Al answers make sense.
- · Asking teachers about the AI usage guidelines.
- Reviewing classroom/school academic integrity guidelines.

Learning more about the Student Attendance and Engagement Policy

Did you know? The Student Attendance and Engagement Policy guides our approach to attendance and is in place to support all students.

The policy states that regular, punctual attendance supports academic success, responsibility, and preparation for the future.

Ensuring regular attendance is a joint effort between students, families and schools. As a parent/guardian, you play an important role by monitoring attendance, communicating with the school when your child is absent, and supporting your child's regular attendance.

What can you do?

- ✓ Monitor and encourage punctual, consistent attendance
- ✓ Maintain open communication with the school when absences or challenges arise
- ✓ Work with school staff to understand supports or accommodations for your child
- ✓ Be aware of the attendance thresholds and possible consequences



The relation of primary teeth and mental health conditions: Leveraging Tooth Fairy

We are clinicians and researchers in the fields of dentistry and mental health. We are conducting a research project investigating the relationship of mental and dental health.

Currently, there is little information about this association. We are exploring how mental health and oral health affect each other, and whether children with or without mental health challenges show differences in primary tooth mineralization. This is a research project, which will let us know how to better help parents deal with their children's dental and mental health.

Participation

Parents will be asked to donate fallen-out or removed primary teeth of their children as well as filling out a checklist. This is a multi-site study, and we hope to recruit at least 400 participants from each group of children, including those without any mental health conditions as well as those with mental or neurodevelopmental conditions (e.g., ASD, ADHD, anxiety).

We anticipate that answering to the questions of checklist will take about 20-25 minutes.







The relation of primary teeth and mental health conditions: Leveraging Tooth Fairy

We are exploring how mental health and oral health affect each other, and whether children with or without mental health challenges show differences in primary tooth mineralization.

To assist with this research, you can provide us with baby teeth that have fallen out or been removed. Interested parents will be asked to fill out a checklist.

You are eligible to participate in this study if your child is:

- 1. aged 5-17 years old, and
- 2. has a fallen-out or removed baby tooth that you want to donate.

Inclement Weather and School Cancellations

In the event of school cancellation due to inclement weather and other exceptional circumstances, the decision to cancel school is made as close to 6 am as possible. Here are some ways you can find out:

At times schools may be cancelled by "Family of Schools". We are in the Sackville High family of schools. In the event school is cancelled during the school day, the decision is usually made by 11:00 am. The school will contact all families to confirm procedures to release your children. Please ensure your child knows what to do in case of early closure and ensure that your phone numbers and email addresses are up-to-date so we can contact you. Students are not released until we have made contact with a parent/guardian or designate as you identified when you updated information on PowerSchool in September.

If school is cancelled during the day, we will dismiss students as per their parent/guardian instruction at 12:00. If you can avoid it, do not come to pick your child up early as this will result in congestion in the office area. Parents, guardians and caregivers are requested to wait outside their regular dismissal door at 12:00 for their children.

On days when conditions exist that it is not safe to open schools at the regularly scheduled time but it is predicted that conditions will improve, a 2-hour delayed opening may be considered. In this situation, students at Smokey Drive cannot arrive before 10:15 am and classes will begin at 10:25 am. Lunch and dismissal times will not be affected in this case.
